

## California Consortium for Urban Indian Health (CCUIH) Speakers



Hannah Youngdeer (MPH) is the Public Health Program Coordinator for the California Consortium for Urban Indian Health where she helps coordinate the Tribal Medication Assisted Treatment Expansion project, serving Urban Indian Health Programs in their efforts to expand substance use and harm reduction services.



Adrienne Leddy (Chamorro) is the Project Specialist with the California Consortium for Urban Indian Health (CCUIH) and is a youth harm reductionist born and raised in San Francisco, California. Adrienne has been involved in harm reduction-based community work since they were a young teenager in San Francisco and have been with CCUIH as part of the Tribal Medication Assisted Treatment (TMAT) and Getting Real About Stigma Prevention for Hepatitis C Virus (GRASP-HCV) programs since 2019. Their primary focus at CCUIH is centering on overdose prevention and naloxone distribution, developing and distributing public health education materials, and youth outreach and engagement.



Jackie Pierson, MSW, MA (Anishinaabe), is the Director of Wellness and Healing Programs at the California Consortium for Urban Indian Health (CCUIH). Jackie has worked in the behavioral health field for the past 20 years focusing on trauma, community wraparound services and public health awareness. Her current focus at CCUIH has been supporting the statewide Tribal Medication Assisted Treatment (TMAT) Opioid Response project through education, stigma reduction, naloxone access expansion, and increased access to culturally relevant services and materials. She has also developed and is leading her CalHOPE Redline team to provide resource, referral, and peer-emotional support warmlines which focuses on various issues that impact the well-being of AIAN community members living in California.
